Notes from Pastor Tim.....

What Are You Looking For?

During my week of spiritual renewal I attended Sunday worship at a nearby congregation. There was much about the experience that I appreciated: someone greeted me at the door and held it for me as I entered. The narthex was clean and had a display of materials that visitors might find helpful. During the offering we passed a pew pad, which I could inconspicuously sign while also reading the names of those sitting next to me. The pad also included a church brochure, which I was encouraged to take. Most importantly, when the service ended the man in the pew behind me tapped my shoulder and very kindly struck up a conversation and invited me to coffee hour. Moments later a woman did the same. In both cases the introduction went something like this, "Hello, I don't think I've met you before. Have you been coming here for very long, or are you new to the church?" I appreciated how they were willing to risk the introduction even if they had neglected to notice me in the past. I noticed in their bulletin that the final act of their worship service was a 5-minute time for welcoming one another before coffee hour. I don't remember what they called it, but they were intentional about greeting people whom they hadn't previously met. Only after that time did they eat. Coffee hour was a pot luck affair with a healthy spread of options. There was a friendly man wearing a sandwich board and gently requesting volunteers to sign up for future coffee hours. Though I hadn't planned to stick around, something about the kind welcome that I received compelled me to visit for a while.

Something else of interest happened as well. During the worship service, in place of the sermon, the pastor shared in a dialogue with a woman who represented the Muslim religion. Their theme was "oneness" as it pertains to the two different traditions. The dialogue, it turns out, was part of a series of conversational "sermons" that had been taking place for the middle weeks of July and August. The man who tapped me on the shoulder after worship explained that the conversation wasn't typical to their regular style of worship. So, I asked him if he appreciated it. He and his wife nodded enthusiastically and said, "We are always glad for the opportunity to learn something about other people. It was very interesting."

It is that comment that is still on my mind. I too appreciate opportunities to learn about others, and I was certainly interested in what the speakers had to say that morning. But, the comment makes me wonder what it is exactly that people are seeking in worship. What is it that churches are offering? Is the point and purpose of worship to learn something? To an extent I believe it is. But, is it to learn something that we might just as easily learn from a lecture? Is worship intended to inform us? Do we do it to gain information? Have you ever come across a gospel story in which the appropriate response to something that Jesus has said or done is, "That's very interesting,"?

I admit that I'm being a bit critical here. But, I don't mean to do it in a non-constructive way. And, I don't mean to do it in a judgmental way either. As I mentioned, there was much about the experience that I appreciated. And, I even appreciate the pastor's ambition in doing something creative and different in worship. Even more, I'm aware that I'm far from

perfect and that not everybody loves everything I say or do during worship.

Still, I would like to say this: I was craving God that morning. I was needing to hear of a love that creates, and overcomes, and calls, and blesses, and fills, and inspires, and challenges, and leads, and moves, and saves. I needed Good News and what I was offered was interesting and even important, but not quite all that.

So, I wonder, what are you seeking from worship on Sunday mornings? What is it that you think our worship should offer?

Though it may sound a bit bold or grandiose, I think our worship should offer God. I think it should speak to us of a divine, holy love. I think it should attempt to convey that love. I think it should give us the opportunity to receive that love, claim it, and respond to it. I think it should do more than inform and interest us. I think it should shape us and bring us into oneness with ultimate reality and the source of all life and goodness.

Our worship may not always succeed. (How could it?) But, at least it should try.

Brian Donahue to Speak at TCC about Adult Adoption Issues September 13th at 11:30

Please join us in the sanctuary after coffee hour for this important discussion! The following is from Brian:

I am a biological father of 1, adoptive father of 2. In my private life, I am an adoptee legal rights advocate. I have worked professionally at DCF for the past 21 years. In my advocacy, I do not represent DCF. I advocate with Access Connecticut. I am on the Board for Public Policy at the National Foster Parent Association. I am a member of the American Adoption Congress. I have a Master's of Social Work. I also have a Post Master's Certificate for Clinical Issues in Adoption.

My presentation will discuss: What are the presenting concerns for adult adoptees? Why do Adult Adoptees want their biological Information? Myths? What occurred in 2014? What we are proposing to the UCC Connecticut Conference for a resolution, and why? What we are doing currently to build support for 2016? What we are hoping to achieve in Connecticut and nationally for adult adoptees.

WINDOW RENOVATION UPDATE

In wrapping up our long campaign to renovate every single one of our stained glass windows from the narthex, through the sanctuary, into the sacristy and around the Round Room and all the way up into the bell tower, we find ourselves left with one last double hung window in the Round Room (6B) that has not been taken to the stained glass studio for its cleaning and re-leading. After 117 years, the glass is shifting down toward its sill and will eventually fall out with continued opening and closing.

The fund raising started in the 1990's for this renovation, the work in 2009, and the Stained Glass Group hopes to close the books on it before the end of 2015. To avoid budget impact, this process was pursued by sending a window to the studio only <u>after</u> it had been paid for in full. Since no one has shown interest in outright "buying" 6B, we think we will refer to it as the "Congregational Window" to help us raise the \$4,500 for this last window. Ilana Ofgang

Ilana comes to Trumbull CC with a diverse musical background that began in New Fairfield, CT when at age 17 she took her first job as an accompanist at a local church. She immediately fell in love with the job and has worked professionally as an organist, choir conductor, music director, and freelance musician ever since. She graduated summa cum laude from Western Connecticut State University with a degree in Jazz Studies and was one of two students in her graduating class to receive the Henry Barnard Distinguished Student Award for academic success and community service. While attending WCSU, Ilana studied jazz piano, classical piano, organ, and voice, and also received her Colleague's Certification from the American Guild of Organists. During and after college, Ilana toured professionally with the Celtic Fusion band MacTalla Mor, serving as keyboardist, Gaelic singer, and composer. Five years ago, she received her Juris Doctor from Fordham University School of Law. Since graduating law school, she has pursued a legal career in public interest law, her interests being in criminal defense, civil rights, prisoner's rights, and immigration, while also maintaining a busy schedule as a church musician. Ilana has great faith in the power of music to deepen the experience of communal worship and inspire people towards social action. She currently lives with her husband in Bridgeport, CT and is very excited to serve as music director at Trumbull CC.

TCC Goals and Priorities

Church Council and our various church boards have been engaged in a discussion about "what's next" for the ministries of our congregation. We've divided church work into a number of different categories and we've shared thoughts about where we might most effectively focus our energies. Here's what we came up with:

Spiritual Nurture

Pastor Tim will offer regular spiritual growth opportunities throughout the year by leading a weekly evening class for adults during which we'll exchange thoughts as we engage with a variety of small group resources, including books and videos that Tim will select.

Additionally, we hope to offer a youth group program that meets more consistently and includes faith nurture opportunities as part of its gatherings.

Worship

We are thrilled that Ilana is with us now as our settled music director and we are looking forward to encouraging parishioner involvement through increased special music opportunities. Additional ideas for special holiday music, such as a Good Friday cantata and an Easter brass quintet are in the works as well.

Missions

The Outreach committee is excited about discerning new ways to be hands-on and interactive in missions. We hope to build on new initiatives such as Heifer, CROP, and LIGHT (Sarah's Thornton's organization,) and we are considering an "Alternative Christmas Fair" in early December, which will raise social awareness along with funds that will benefit people in crisis all around the world.

Hospitality/Evangelism

We want to focus on making sure that people feel welcomed and engaged when they visit our church. We'll talk a bit about intentional acts of hospitality. We'll also more actively publicize the good works we do through local media outlets (Thanks, Don Esbach!) and we'll more effectively use social media by transferring responsibilities to the office.

Stewardship

Our "New Consecration Sunday" fall campaign will aim at increasing participation by focusing on the *need to give* that we have as people of faith. You'll be invited to a special luncheon to celebrate our ministries and we hope you will come!

Lay Leadership

Pastor Tim is working with CT Conference leaders to put together an event that will assist local congregations at they consider ways to restructure that enhance vision and better utilize member gifts. Please look for a November event and consider joining a team of TCC participants.

Pastoral Leadership

Pastor Tim is planning to use a week of spiritual renewal/continuing education time in August, which will allow him time to review resources for adult education, research field trip/excursion ideas, plan worship themes, work on a church calendar, and more.

FROM WESLEY VILLAGE.....

Wesley Heights will host the TEAM Festival of Trees on Saturday, November 21st and Sunday November 22nd 2015. In conjunction with this event, we will also be featuring a Wesley Village Craft Fair, and would like to give you the opportunity to take a booth at this fair. Because the event is a two-day event, you may register for either or both days. If you plan on doing both days, you must be aware that it will not be possible to leave your booth set up overnight. You will have to clear the booth at the end of the fair on Saturday and set it up again on Sunday morning. Set-up is 8:00 AM both days. After you set up your booth, you will drive your car to the parking lot at Long Hill School, and there will be a shuttle available to return to Wesley Heights.

Registration is on a first-come, first-served basis because we are limited in space. 
